## **STRATEGIC TRADE (RESTRICTED END-USERS AND PROHIBITED END-USERS) ORDER 2010**

IN exercise of the powers conferred by section 8 of the Strategic Trade Act 2010 [*Act 708*], the Minister makes the following order:

### **1. Citation and commencement**

**(1)** This order may be cited as the **Strategic Trade (Restricted End-Users and Prohibited End-Users) Order 2010**.

**(2)** This Order comes into operation on 1 January 2011.

### **2. Interpretations**

In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires--

"country"  
includes territory;

"decision of the United Nations Security Council"  
means a decision of the United Nations Security Council in resolutions made under Chapter VII of the Charter of the United Nations signed at San Francisco on 26 June 1945;

"military items"  
means the military items listed in Part 1 of the Schedule to the Strategic Trade (Strategic Items) Order 2010 [*P.U. (A) 485*];

"prohibited end-user"  
means any person or country specified in the Second Schedule that is under an embargo and includes any person or country that is subject to any proliferation of weapons of mass destruction-related sanction imposed pursuant to a decision of the United Nations Security Council;

"restricted end-user"  
means any person or country specified in the First Schedule that is subject to stricter export or trade controls and includes any person or country that is subject to any proliferation of weapons of mass destruction-related sanction imposed pursuant to a decision of the United Nations Security Council;

"restricted military items"  
means, in relation to the countries and destinations specified in Part 3D of the First Schedule, the military items listed in the Third Schedule;

"Strategic Items Order"  
means the Strategic Trade (Strategic Items) Order 2010.

### **3. Restricted end-users**

For the purpose of subsection 8(1) of the Act, the persons and countries specified in the First Schedule are designated as restricted end-users for which a special permit under the Act is required to export, tranship or bring in transit strategic items or unlisted items.

### **4. Prohibited end-users**

For the purpose of subsection 8(2) of the Act, the persons and countries specified in the Second Schedule are designated as prohibited end-users to which all export, transshipment or transit of strategic items or unlisted items is prohibited.

1. Korea Mining Development Trading Corporation ((a.k.a. Changgwang Sinyong Corporation; a.k.a. External Technology General Corporation; a.k.a. DPRKN Mining Development Trading Cooperation; a.k.a. "KOMID"). Central District, Pyongyang, DPRK. Primary arms dealer and main exporter of goods and equipment related to ballistic missiles and conventional weapons)
2. Korea Ryonbong General Corporation ((a.k.a. Korea Yonbong General Corporation; formerly known as (f.k.a.) Lyongaksan General Trading Corporation). Tanchon Commercial Bank was designated by the Committee in April 2009 and is the main DPRK financial entity for sales of conventional arms, ballistic missiles, and goods related to the assembly and manufacture of such weapons. KOMID was designated by the Committee in April 2009 and is the DPRK's primary arms dealer and main exporter of goods and equipment related to ballistic missiles and conventional weapons. ### 1. Small arms and light weapons within ML1 and ML2

Items specified in ML1.a, ML1.b, ML1.c or ML2.a in Part I of the Strategic Trade (Strategic Items) Order 2010 that are designed to be carried, operated and fired by an individual or by three or fewer individuals acting together, other than mortars with a calibre of 100mm or more.

### 2. Accessories and ammunition for small arms and light weapons within ML1 and ML2

The following "military items":

- (a) accessories specified in ML1.d or ML2.c in Part I of the Strategic Trade (Strategic Items) Order 2010 that are capable of being used in connection with weapons falling within paragraph 1;
- (b) weapon specified in ML5.a in Part I of Strategic Trade (Strategic Items) Order 2010 that are designed for use with weapons falling within paragraph 1; and
- (c) ammunition that is capable of being fired or launched by weapons falling within paragraph 1.

### 3. Light weapons within ML4

Equipment specified in entry ML4.b in Part I of the Strategic Trade (Strategic Items) Order 2010 that is--

- (a) specially designed for firing or launching rockets, grenades, missiles or other explosive devices; and
- (b) designed to be carried, operated and fired by an individual or by three or fewer individuals acting together.

### 4. Ammunition for light weapons within ML4

Rockets, grenades, missiles and other explosive devices that are--

- (a) specified in entry ML4 in Part I of the Strategic Trade (Strategic Items) Order 2010; and
- (b) capable of being fired or launched from equipment falling within paragraph 3.

### 5. Hand grenades

Grenades specified in entry ML4 in Part I of the Strategic Trade (Strategic Items) Order 2010 that are designed to be thrown.

### 6. Man-portable air defence systems (MANPADS), missiles for MANPADS, associated equipment and their specially designed components

The following military items which do not fall in paragraph 3 or 4:

- (a) man-portable air defence systems (MANPADS), as follows:
  - (i) surface-to-air missile systems designed to be man-portable and operated and fired by

- (ii) a single individual; and surface-to-air missile systems designed to be operated and fired by more than one individual acting as a crew and portable by several individuals;
- (b) missiles for MANPADS;
- (c) production equipment specially designed for MANPADS;
- (d) field test equipment specially designed for MANPADS; and
- (e) specialized training equipment and simulators for MANPADS.

### 7. Long-range missiles

Missiles capable of a range of 300km or more that fall within Part I of the Strategic Trade (Strategic Items) Order 2010.

### 8. Components for items within this Schedule

Components specially designed for military items falling within any of paragraphs 1 to 7.
